**MEMORANDUM**

Complainant has filed a complaint of judicial misconduct against a judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. For the following reasons, the misconduct complaint will be dismissed.

Complainant alleges that the subject judge declined, under oath, to answer questions he was obligated to answer. But complainant does not explain why he believes the subject judge was obligated to do so, or why this alleged conduct gives rise to a finding of judicial misconduct. In a separate allegation, complainant refers to conduct that is attributable to other government officials and not the subject judge, and which therefore does not give rise to a finding of judicial misconduct against the subject judge. Because the misconduct complaint “lack[s] sufficient evidence to raise an inference that misconduct has occurred,” it must be dismissed. JUD. CONF. RULES FOR JUDICIAL-CONDUCT AND JUDICIAL-DISABILITY PROCEEDINGS, Rule 11(c)(1)(D); see 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii).<sup>1</sup>

U.S., RULES FOR JUDICIAL-CONDUCT AND JUDICIAL-DISABILITY PROCEEDINGS, Rule 18(a), the complainant may file a petition for review by the Judicial Council for the District of Columbia Circuit. Any petition must be filed in the Office of the Circuit Executive for the D.C. Circuit within 42 days of the date of the dismissal order. *Id.* Rule 18(b).
